1. RCONA (Roseville Coalition of Neighborhood Associations), www.rcona.org/
 - a. Formed in 1993
 - b. 42 different neighborhoods in Roseville City Limits, 31 non-industrial.
 - c. Works to facilitate communication within and between neighborhoods, improve quality of life (movie in the park, Santa in the Park, National Neighborhood Day), and help neighborhoods to help solve social, physical and economic problems.
 - d. WestPark Neighborhood Association is a part of RCONA!

Dr. Denise Herrmann - Roseville Joint Union High School District Superintendent

- 3. West Park High School
 - a. Home of the Panthers!
 - b. Colors are navy and gold
 - c. Site is 52 acres, and will be built in phases
 - i. Phase I: Football Stadium (sunken stadium with artificial cork turf), Gym, Administration Building, Cafeteria, and two of the three-story classroom buildings.
 - 1. Will Open August of 2020 to approximately 800 freshman and sophomores.
 - ii. Phase II: Hopefully to start in 2020, and will take two years to complete. Additional three-story classroom buildings, Library, Additional sports fields and amenities.
 - 1. Will house 2200 students when Phase II is fully complete
 - iii. Max school capacity is 2600 students, with an average of 34 per class.
 - d. School is designed by DLR architects, and is modeled after an award winning high school, Marysville Getchell High School, in Seattle, Washington.
 - i. Will consist of three-story classroom buildings with first floor open atriums, flexible spaces, an emphasis on natural light, and science/engineering labs on the first floors.
 - e. Construction is being done by Turner Construction Company
 - i. Construction Timeline: Site work and the pouring of footings will continue through September 2018, October/November 2018 pads will be poured,

Structural steel work will continue through the winter, and in the spring of 2019 they will continue work on the buildings, athletic fields, and start designing Phase II. Phase I will be complete in the summer of 2020.

- f. A city park will surround the school
 - i. In the original high school plans there is a practice field space, but in the current plans the practice field will be replaced with the varsity softball field (since the building of the city park, which is designed to house the varsity softball field, is not a done deal yet).
 - ii. The funds for the development of the city park are related to Measure B on the upcoming November 6th ballot!
- g. Measure D/Developer Fees/SFID (School Facility Improvement District) tax are what are paying for the high school to be built.
4. District is starting conversations for what kind of specialized programs will be available. Looking at what might be missing in the district as well as what might we need more of?
5. The high school WILL NEED A LOT OF VOLUNTEERS AND SUPPORT FROM PARENTS the first few years after opening (since there will be no upperclassmen to support the freshman and sophomores on campus)!
6. Other Note: The city is not able right now to partner with the high school pool to make it open to the public.

1. Receive under \$54 a student from the district.
2. PTC provides:
 - a. Administrative Support: \$11,794
 - i. Includes items such as 5th grade t-shirts, Office Support, Teacher Appreciation Week, Principal's Fund, and PTC operating costs.
 - b. Enrichment: \$14,945

- i. Includes items such as Art Docent Supplies, Assemblies, JOLT, Teacher Professional Development and Support Funds
- c. School Donations: \$14,945
 - i. Includes items such as iReady, Leader In Me, PBIS, Grade-Level Experiences, STEM-ReCreate, new laminator
- d. Fundraising: \$59,684
 - i. Main Fundraisers (\$40,000+): Jump Start and Jaguar Jam
 - ii. Events (\$20,000): Fall Carnival, Parents Night Out, Skate Nights
 - iii. Hands Free Funds (\$2000)
 - iv. Business Sponsorships (\$4250)
 - v. Grants? (\$12,340)
